When I was eight years old, my family moved to Washington from El Salvador. Amazingly, we moved into an apartment building right across the street from DC Prep Benning. I looked out the window and there was my new school. I enrolled at DC Prep as a 3rd grader.

It was a very rough transition. I didn't know English, or the alphabet, or how to pronounce words. Some of the kids made fun of me – but kids are kids. Others had sympathy. The teachers, though, always supported me. They knew I couldn't speak well so when I had questions they asked me to write them in Spanish. That way I could keep up with the work even if I couldn't speak up in class. But it didn't work, and I made straight Fs for almost the whole year. A bilingual teacher continued to work with me and suddenly it all made sense. I started getting all As, and I've been getting them ever since. At DC Prep, you aren't expected to be automatically smart, instead you are supported, challenged, and helped to do what you think is beyond your limits.

My old school in Salvador was nothing like DC Prep. You were expected to be smart and if you weren't you were punished – either hit by the teacher or called terrible names. When I was in 2nd grade the teacher told the class that if anyone tore their paper she would send them back to 1st grade. As a 2nd grader that was about the worst thing you could imagine. A girl who has just transferred into the class accidentally ripped her paper and she sent her to 1st grade – not for a few days, or weeks, or months, but for the *whole year*. I never saw her again.

Another thing I have learned at DC Prep that's different from Salvador is that there are many different perspectives on issues. You don't have to think just one way. And you can open up a whole new wide world for yourself if you look at things from different points of view.

Now that I'm in the 8th grade I've started to look at high schools. When I think back to five years ago I couldn't have imagined this. I've already visited some of the top schools in and around Washington. In July, I went to a summer program at Episcopal High School. And because of DC Prep and all I have learned there, that transition was very smooth.
